Documentation for Home Visitors This training will cover the essential points of effective documentation in home visiting. Participants will learn general documentation rules and guidelines, how to decide what to document in the case file, and strategies for staying strength-based while addressing risks and concerns. This training will be beneficial to any home visitor needing to document their efforts to teach child development, promote positive health and safety practices, and encourage positive parent-child interaction. This training is not designed to help participants reduce the amount of documentation needed, but will help the participant focus on documenting only the necessary information.
